



SHOULD IT BE 100% BRITISH? by Cort Musgrave

After reading the controversial article "Almost British Cars", I felt an urge to respond. My feelings are that we should exercise a little flexibility on our definition of a British car. I agree that current look-alike "Kit Cars" should not be accepted. They are not original and under their look alike fiberglass exteriors these are totally different vehicles. The use of modern suspension and brake systems make these cars handle entirely different. For example, the AC Cobra sets on transverse leaf springs, the contemporary kit Cobras usemodern coil spring suspensions. The difference in handling would be quite remarkable, my hat is off to the men that use to race the old AC's.

An exception would have to be made for the old Kit cars that were available during the 50's and 60's in England. These kits were made available from manufactures so their customers could get around the tax laws in England. I doubt if any of those kits ever made it to the U.S... Is anyone aware of where one might be?

As for the Sterling. I feel that we should exercise flexibility in this case. The Sterling may look like a Honda but a comparison road test done by Motor Week showed the British counter part to out handle it's Japanese cousin in the Solomon course. It also took a shorter distance to stop in the brake test. I see the Sterling as an example of how the British can improve on a car while making it more luxurious.

If we omit British cars because they not 100% British we will eliminate some very fine vehicles from our fold. We can go back to the old Allard's of the 50's. These cars were fitted with various makes of American engines and transmissions. Many other British car manufactures also followed the tend of installing American engines and transmissions in their cars. Early LOTUS Europa's came with French engines and transmissions. LOTUS mounted the units end-for-end producing a mid-engine design. The old TRV's of the early 60's were fitted with VW torsion bar suspensions. The Bristol engine started life as a BMW engine. Rover's V8 started life as a GM V8.

An "All British Car Show" should be very proud to have a true "British hybrid" on display. Cars such as Allard, AC Cobra, TRV, Griffith, and Sunbeam Tiger set a period in history which any British car enthusiast can and should be proud of. The standard should be, "It may not be 100% British, but because it was designed and built by a British factory, we accept it." Their are some very interesting British hybrids out there. Think of the Ford GT 40.

Well Jim, you got my response. I welcome any comments.

This is not Terry's first time in the winner's circle. He put on the E. E. Reynolds rallye four years ago. I'm looking forward to seeing what he has in store for us next November.


MINUTES of the GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING of NOVEMBER 1994 by Jim Jones

A vote was taken and the <u>NEW ORLEANS HAMBURGER</u> location is now the offical place for the General Membership Meeting!



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
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THE CLUB XMAS PARTY



I began looking around for a DTP package that I could afford. Wow! Like, I mean they all were expensive! Three hundred to six hundred dollars expensive. I had to find something with in my budget range even if I did not get all the goodies that I wanted.

As luck would have it, Keith Vezina gave me two "Windows" magazines with articles on how to produce good newsletters. While reading the articles, I came across an advertisement for a DTP package which I could afford. The package sold for \$59.95 (seems nothing ever sells for even money) and all the bells & whistles could be included for \$99.95 (editing, art, tables, and font applications).


I called them toll free and asked all the questions of them that I had about the package. It all sounded good and I ordered the whole ball of wax (the whole package for you too young to know the phase).

A few weeks later the package arrived at my house by Federal Express. I am well pleased with it, of course, nothing comes without some pain. I locked up and crashed the program a few times and even had them send me a maintenance disk to help with some error messages. It turned out that I was creating the errors, not the program. I tend to do things like that until I have worked with new things for a while. Heck, I even did that with Windows.

I am still working with level 2 of 3 in the program. But I am learning all the time and the manual is the friendliest one that I have used.
