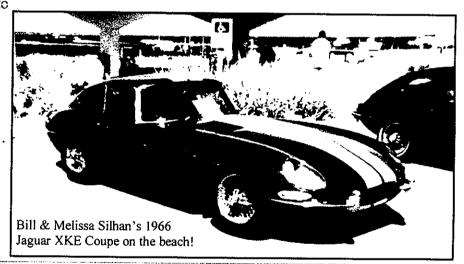

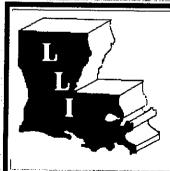

Hydraulic Lines by Mr. GoodSpanner

We tend to forget about the hydraulic lines on our British cars. That can be a costly mistake! Many years have passed since they were newly installed and we rely on them so much. Road conditions eat away on them on the outside and moisture absorbed in the hydraulic fluid eats away on them on the inside. Sooner or later one of them is going to get you.

You can delay the harmful effects that water has on the lines by bleeding the hydraulic fluid out of the brake/clutch systems until fresh fluid appears at all the cylinder bleeders. It is recommended that this be done every one or two years. Stir up the black and brown sediment that you will find in the bottom of the master cylinder reservoir before doing so and rid the system of that as well. The black stuff is rubber particles and the brown is dissolved rust.

One fellow that I know tops off his reservoirs with a small amount of silicone brake fluid. The silicone fluid floats on the surface of regular brake fluid. Silicone fluid does not absorb moisture and it theoretically forms a seal over the regular brake fluid preventing moisture from coming into contact with it. Sounds good to me, but I have no proof that it works.

I do not recommend changing to silicone brake fluid unless you renew the whole system, including all cylinders, flexible hoses, and steel lines. Firstly, the two different types of hydraulic fluids do not mix and have different characteristics. Secondly, you cannot ensure that you be able to remove all of the old fluid. Thirdly, silicone fluid will swell rubber parts that have been in contact with hydrostatic brake fluid and this will cause problems like covering cylinder vent or return holes. The British car manufactures have typically used natural rubber as opposed to synthetic or vinyl in their hydraulic cylinders. I utilized silicone fluid for both the brake and clutch hydraulic systems in my '69 MGC-GT and never have any problems. However, everything in both systems had been replaced with new or NOS parts.

In order to replace the hydraulic lines on your British car, you can order a kit from most all suppliers of British car parts. Not everything that you will need is included in these kits. Do not be surprised to find that the new lines are coiled up and that you will have to first straighten them and then shape them to fit your car. Purchase a tool made for forming steel lines. No one tool will form the lines into all the shapes that you might need. You may have to purchase two different tools.

If you are more industrious, you can make up your own custom hydraulic lines. You will need the above-mentioned tools plus a flaring kit. Be sure that the flaring kit is capable of producing double bubble flares, as that is the most common flare used on British cars.

The steel lines can be obtained from NAPA either by the foot from a roll or straight with American fittings and flares already in place. These lines come in different lengths. With the made up lines, you just cut one end off, slip the American fittings off, slide on a British fitting down to the flared end (proper way around), slide another British fitting on (the other way around) and make your flare. Or just use the NAPA lines as they are, utilizing a coupling provided by Victoria British. The coupling has a British Standard male thread on one end and American Standard female thread on the other end. (Woops, I think they refer to those as "jack" and "plug" now days, but I cannot remember which is which!) The adapter couplings do cost around \$5 American each and you will need quite a few.

The British Standard fittings can be purchased from any British parts supplier, unless what you need is Whitworth fittings. Do not laugh! Morris Minors, early MG Midgets, AH Sprites, to name just a few, all had Whitworth hydraulic line fittings. You may be surprised at just how many early British cars did. The Morris Minor's flexible brake line hoses are threaded British Standard at the wheel cylinder end and Whitworth at the steel line end.
