And the most important requirement our club has is.....


The restaurant management must want our business, long term !!!

May 29 Minutes

The June 26th meeting was called to order by vice-president Bill Breithoff. President Charlie Ake was unable to make the meeting. Two new members, also members of the Jaguar Club, were in attendance.

The next general meeting, on July 30, will be held at the Italian Pie on Jefferson Highway in Harahan. One of the long time members pointed out that in a way, this is a return to the club's roots. The original club meeting place in the 70's was a pizza place.

The July event, dinner at Sal's in Boutte was discussed. Several people commented that the timing for last month's crawfish boil was perfect. The following weekend, the park was under water.

Barbara Wolf has preparations under control for the 4^{th} Annual UnCar Show at the Tap Room in Mandeville on Sunday August 12^{th} , from 4-7. Get that project car rolling, and let the cat walk on the bonnet.

Other future events include the Funkana in September and the EE Reynolds Rally in November. Keith Vezina will be Rally master again. Keith said he needs a couple of helpers to man the check point and that he is tired of running the rally. Several people pointed out that the obvious solution to the problem, since the WINNER becomes the following year's rally master, was to LOOSE!

Allen Bradley reported on the Houston MG Show. Bill Harris will be in Premier class next year, since this was his 2nd first place. The show is held at Trader's Village, a large open-air market place in the northwest quadrant of Houston. Harold O'Reilly reported on the Thunderbird show. Harold's T-Bird took 2nd in the driver division.

Cliff Hughes showed everyone the new club license plate frames. Cliff pointed out that you could paint the letters to match your car. Jim Jones suggested spraying a little clear coat on the back of the frames for extra protection. The club is selling them for \$5 or two for \$9. Similar metal frames sell in catalogs for \$20.

The site for the 2002 British Car Day show was discussed. Lafreniere park is planning to construct a large garden walkway around the Foundation Center pavilion where we have held our show. They are not certain if the construction will be completed in time. They have also asked that the club pay \$1,500 for the pavilion in January. The officers do not feel the club can afford to commit to that amount that far in advance of the show. In the event of rain, we would not have the entry fees to cover the expenditure.

Several other sites have been investigated. Roger Gibson reported that Zephyr stadium would charge \$1,000 for 150 parking places and 2 porta-potties. He contacted several area plantation homes. Destrahan is not interested and Ormond is already booked for our date. The Treasure Chest Casino is a possibility as is the UNO Campus.

Chris Marz, a past member, thanked all the club members for all the help he received with his last project. He is moving back into the area soon and will be becoming an active member once again.

Keith Vezina pointed out that there is almost a 33% markup between jobber prices and retail prices. He found that the starter on his Maxima was \$329 retail at Nappa, \$139 rebuilt, and water pump was \$260 jobber price and \$349 retail price. Cliff Hughes wanted to know if anyone else had problems with AutoZone brake pads squeaking. Many people answered "YES". Cliff said he had tried anti-squeak treatment and anti-squeal shims and nothing worked. They stop fine, but they are noisy.

While in the process of disassembling my 1949 Austin of England A40 Dorset, I came across something. I had found it before in cars, but not in this shape or quantity.




