
Spider Web Award—Charlie Ake

Garage Building & First Tools Tips by Mr. Goodspanner

Here are some tips for you if are thinking of building your very own personal British hobby car garage.

SIZE: The physical size of the building will depend on the amount of land and amount of money you have. The bigger the better! A storage/work garage, no matter how large, will fill up quickly.

COST: A wood framed building will cost the most to construct. A metal building will cost much less. Choose a metal building constructed with "I" beams and "Z" beams, not a cheaper building using square tubes for the framing structure. In order to save money, have only the basic building constructed on a concrete slab. You can always have the driveway poured later on. You can install the roll up door(s), windows, insulation, etc. yourself.

ELECTRICITY: You can never have enough 110-volt outlets. Extension cords are a pain and can be a tripping hazard. Install four-plex outlets and plenty of them all around the walls. Consider at least one each of a 220 volt 20 amp and 30 amp outlet as well. Air compressors and such run much better on 220 volt 20 amp lines. Most electric welders require a 220 volt 30 amp line. If you install wire that is one gauge over the requirement, you never have brown outs or tripped circuit breakers to deal with. The extra cost is minimal.

LIGHTING: Fluorescent lighting is the only way to go. The operating cost is lower than incandescent lighting, they do not produce near as much heat, and you can choose the type of light by selecting the proper bulb for you needs. No amount of planning will allow you to position the lights properly. Hang the fixtures from the roof or ceiling using small chains. Drop ceiling hanging clips are available from any wholesale electrical house. That way you can easily move them later on to suit your needs.

AIR CONDITIONING: It is the ultimate luxury. You will not always be able to use it (as when fuel vapors are present), but it sure is nice on those really hot summer days. With a wood framed building, the installation of a window A/C unit and insulation is straightforward.

It takes a little more doing in a metal building, but it can be done. Forget about all of that new style sprayon insulation, etc. Ordinary Kraft paper backed fiberglass house insulation works the best.

Construct 4' X 8' (or whatever height the ceiling you choose) wooden strip frames. Screw the wooden frames to the metal uprights/beams. Install the proper depth of insulation by stapling its backing to the frames. Panel the frames with pressboard or such and paint. White color recommended. Any other color will reduce the amount of light produced by your lighting fixtures. Do not forget to insulate the ceiling. The lower the placement of the ceiling, the less square footage there is to cool. An eight foot ceiling is fine, unless you plan to install a lift. An automatic garage door opener will require a 10' ceiling height above the opened door assembly.

In a well-insulated building, a couple of electric space heaters will do just fine in the wintertime.

Even if you have A/C, cooling fans are a must. Pedestal fans work well in helping to keep you cool and can be moved around easily.

WORK BENCHES: You can build workbenches and heavy-duty shelves out of 2"X4s". But if you nail them to the wall for support, they will be hard to remove later on. Use only wood screws for this purpose.

The best bet is the use of pallet shelves for workbenches and shelves. Once assembled, they can hold anything that you may place on them, (complete engines are no sweat) they are heavy enough to not need bolting to the shop floor or the walls, the height of the shelves are adjustable, and they can be moved as necessary. New pallet shelves are expensive, but they can be obtained used from time to time for a faction of their cost when new from companies that are going out of business.

MAJOR TOOLS: Other than the basic automotive hand tools, I suggest the following.

National MGB Registry

Bench Grinder - With a grinding wheel on one end and a wire wheel on the other end. Do not bolt the base of the motor to the work bench. Instead, mount two bolts into the work bench spaced one inch inboard from the outer edges of the motor's base and sticking up about one inch above the work bench. This will allow you to reposition the grinder against the bolts and still have it stay in place.

Dremel Kit - Or like item. This little drill motor with all of its attachments can be used in a hundred different ways.

Floor Jack - Choose one with a low height at rest (British sports cars are low to the ground.) and the highest lift as possible.

Jack Stands - Purchase four of the cast iron heavy-duty type with sliding heads and release arms, not the cheap solid one-piece type.

Drop Light - A fluorescent trouble light. Incandescent lights are hot and burn out the first time that you hit them against anything. Get two!

Impact Wrench - An electric impact tool is best. It yields higher torque than air operated tools and you do not need to have an air compressor to operate it, just 110 volts AC.

Catch Basins: Several pans to hold drained fluids. Kitty litter pans are great for this purpose.
