

February 26 Minutes

The Switch that I Needed by Jim Jones

The toggle type headlamp switch that operates the two-speed wiper conversion on my 1960 Morris Minor 1000 Traveller has never worked properly. It did not feel right and the wiper speed was the same in low position as it was in the high position. I had jumped the modified wiper motor wires and



proved that the wiper motor was operating correctly in both speeds. So, it had to be the switch that was at fault.

I ordered a MG Midget toggle headlamp switch from two different suppliers only to have the item backordered each time. One supplier told me that he did not know just how long it would be before he received any.

Mini Mania sent me a sales flyer that offered a Morris Minor toggle type headlamp switch at a discount. I jumped at the chance to purchase one. After I received the item, I noticed that the switch did not have a #2 terminal and I needed that terminal for the proper operation of my two-speed wiper conversion. O' no! They are supplying the wrong switch assembly!

But wait. I checked the late model Morris Minor wiring diagram and sure enough terminal #2 is not utilized and so does not come installed on the switch for the Morris Minor.

What to do? Well, I concluded that I could probably install a suitable terminal from a single position switch assembly. The hole that would allow me to do just that was already drilled out in position #2 in the base of the Morris switch. Not having a small enough diameter pop-rivet to secure the terminal to the switch's base, I threaded a machine screw into the already existing hole in order to secure the added terminal.

I was able to complete the task that I had set for myself and that made me very happy.

Note: I have observed that the manufactures now only make one switch base (the black plastic part) for the toggle type switch, which they drill to accommodate all eight terminal positions. They only include the necessary terminals needed for the operation of a particular switch. This makes it possible for you to easily add terminals to suit your needs. In the past, the terminals were always secured with copper rivets. Now days, I have found that some of the terminals are secured with aluminum pop-rivets. §

Buying That British Car by Jim Jones

I now have four British cars. A Morris Minor 1967 Sedan and a 1960 Traveller both in running order, a 1960 Morris Tourer in delayed progress, and a 1949 Austin of England Dorset in active restoration. This car is being built as an "All British Street Rod".



If I had the room, I would have others as well. Club members are always calling me up to tell me about a British car that has come on the market. I would love to own some of them, but I have run out of space. My 24' X 30' garage is filled with British cars.

Step #1. You must have a place to store your British car. A protected car port at least. A garage emptied of junk is best. Rust is the big enemy.

Step #2. Locate others who own the model of car that you are interested in buying. They are in the best position to inform you of the positive and negative aspects of the car in question.

Step #3. The car that strikes your fancy may not be the car for you. Parts availability should be a consideration. If the car that you chosen is not a popular model, make sure that it is complete, as spare parts may be hard or impossible to come by.

Step #4. A running car that is in good condition is your best buy, but it will be the most expensive up front. Restoring a car to like new condition will be the most expensive way to go. But if you like the work, it is your most rewarding choice.

Step #5. Do you have the tools or skills that are necessary for working on the car. Or can you afford to pay someone else to do so? Alternatively, you can have a knowledgeable club members assist you and learn as you go. I assist club members all the time. Teaching skills, working with them, lending tools, etc. Many other club members do the same. Step #6. If all the above works out, purchase the car. Remember that the better condition the car is in, the least amount of effort and expense, as opposed to driving pleasure, will be necessary.
