

2003 British Car Day Recap

This was the most successful British Car Day ever! We had entries from 50 cities in 9 states: Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Tennessee, Arkansas and Oklahoma. 148 people entered 168 cars and roughly 120 people attended the awards banquet, where trophies were awarded in twenty five classes. Entered vehicles ranged from a 1913 Triumph motorcycle and 1929 Rolls Royce Brewster Town Car to a 2002 Mini Cooper; from a pristine, all-original MGT to a highly modified MGB with a V8 engine and a gorgeous metallic silver paint job. The weather was absolutely perfect: sunny, breezy and just warm enough. The beautiful live oaks that surround the field made for pleasant sitting and visiting conditions for the show participants (even if they did dust the nearby cars with pollen!) And the "Lagniappe" bags were a great hit this year. They contained little tool kits, Zymol car care samples, Crystal hot sauce, and a full size can of Stoner tire shine, just to name a few of the goodies included.

In addition, the Mardi Gras T club of New Orleans was celebrating their 25th anniversary and they brought out twenty-three beautiful old T-series cars. Twenty four Jaguars (including a Daimler "formal saloon" -that's "private limousine" in American) appeared, most of which took part in the Jaguar Club of North America, New Orleans chapter's Concourse judging. A newly formed Land Rover club also came out in force with eight Land Rovers, compared to the previous years' one or two. §
