

FUEL GAUGE PROBLEMS by Jim Jones

If your fuel gauge is giving you trouble, here is how to analyze the problem. The electrical system is simple and the parts involved are few. Begin with the problem. What are the symptoms?

1) The fuel gauge does not read at all. After checking to insure that you indeed have fuel in the tank, disconnect the wire that is connected to the fuel sending unit. This unit is always mounted somewhere in the fuel tank itself, the exact location depends on your make and model car.



Ground that wire to the frame of the car. A jumper wire may be helpful here. Turn the ignition key to the "on" position. The fuel gauge needle should begin to slowly travel towards the "full" mark.

If does so, the gauge, the wires, & the voltage stabilizer are good and it is the sending unit that is at fault. Replace it with a new one complete with gasket & locking ring as necessary.

- 2) If the fuel gauge still does not read at all, short across the voltage stabilizer with a jumper wire from terminal "i" to terminal "b". If the needle moves rapidly to the full mark, replace the stabilizer.
- 3) If the fuel gauge is still not working, check for 12 volts at voltage stabilizer terminal "b". If that's OK, the wiring is at fault. You can use a long jumper wire to temporarily replace each wire until you discover which wire is bad. It is not necessary to disconnect the wire that you are testing.

An improperly reading fuel gauge can be caused by poor connections, corroded wires, or the fuel sending unit/fuel gauge itself. One common reason for an always low reading gauge is a cracked float on the fuel sending unit.



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Oil Change & Shrimp Stew Party by Ronnie Palmisano

Floyd and Anne Friloux have a large warehouse attached to their Lubripot Lab office on Airline Highway. They have two auto lifts in the warehouse that are just right for our little British cars. That Saturday morning, about 12 club members went to Floyd and Anne Friloux's warehouse for this exciting event.

Lubriport Labs is a company that performs oil analyses. The engines that they analyze oil from are usually larger than our cars. In most cases, the oil they analyze is from ships and large machinery.

Floyd asked that members bring only three things; oil, filter, and appetite. Besides the stew, we received a free oil analysis of the oil that was drained from our engines. According to Floyd, this analysis can tell many things about the condition of our engines. The analyses can determine if metals or other contaminants are present in the oil. We will then know if bearings and other items are wearing down.

While up on the lift, some members learned some interesting things about their cars. Allen Bradley found a gas leak on at the sending unit on his MGB fuel tank. Keith Vezina found out where the clunking noise on his MGB was coming from. Keith's muffler was hitting the gas tank. Ronnie Palmisano learned the hard way why a TR6 should have an optional spin on oil filter. Ronnie didn't have to collect oil in a jar for his sample; he just gave Floyd his t-shirt!

Green Bean, Walnut & Blue Cheese Salad

1½ pounds fresh green beans, stem ends snapped.

Vinaigrette Dressing:

- 1 Tablespoon Dijon Mustard
- 2 Tablespoon red-wine vinegar
- 3 Tablespoon extra virgin olive oil

Salt and pepper to taste

½ cup walnut halves, lightly toasted

8 ounces Danish blue or Roquefort Cheese cut into ½ inch cubes

- 2 Tablespoons chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley leaves.
- 1 Bring large pot of water to a full rolling boil. Add the green beans and cook just until tender-crisp, about 4 minutes. Drain and dump in ice water to stop them cooking and set the color. Drain and pat dry with paper towels.
- 2 In a large bowl, whisk together mustard, vinegar, salt and pepper. While wisking constantly, slowly drizzle in the olive oil and continue wisking until slightly thickened. Set aside.
- 3 Just before serving, toss green beans and walnuts with vinegrette. Sprinkle with blue cheese and parsley. (Do NOT combine beans and dressing until ready to serve or the beans will discolor.)

This makes a LOT of green beans but it's great for a party.

Bring the cold cooked beans & walnuts in a pretty lidded bowl, everything else in separate zipper bags. Add vinaigrette to beans, shake in closed bowl, garnish and it's ready
