Brits on the River Show, September 25, 2010 by Cathy Greensfelder

It was beautiful weather for the Natchez show: it was maybe a touch too warm, but the skies were blue with a few fluffy white clouds and a nice breeze. The Bradleys, Greensfelders and Vezinas left the Kenner Welcome Center. At the Baton Rouge home of Mary Lynne and Rick Huber, they met up with the Frilouxs, Hubers and Palmisano/Murray. The twelve of them had coffee and pastries at the Huber's house before leaving. Meanwhile, Paul Hornsby was leaving Denham Springs, planning to wait at the side of the road in Saint Francisville for the group coming up from Baton Rouge. By sheer luck, he pulled up to the intersection just as the convoy came over the hill. He pulled right into line without having to stop the engine!!

The group stopped at Mammy's Cupboard, about 8 miles outside Natchez for lunch. The building looks like "Aunt Jemima" and the restaurant is housed in her wide pink skirts. The sandwiches and soup were good and the deserts were great! From Mammy's, they drove through Natchez to the Natchez City Cemetery. The cemetery is north of town and overlooks the Mississippi River and covers roughly 100 acres. It was established in 1822 but has markers showing death dates from the late 1700s indicating that those remains were moved to the cemetery from earlier, private burial sites. They walked through some of the cemetery admiring the iron fences and mausoleum doors and the beautifully carved marble tombstones and monuments. Because our LBCs were so small, the caretaker gave us permission to drive down one of the grass carriage ways through the cemetery on our way out. (Ronnie's SUV had to go around on the road.) It was a shame it was 85 degrees. If it had been a little cooler, we could have spent several hours there.

The rest of the BMCNO participants joined the group at the host hotel in Vidalia bringing the group up to 30 members, spouses and guests and 15 British cars. After the EMC –MS club's reception, members split up and went to several area restaurants for dinner.

The next morning, after a continental breakfast in the hotel and a session of car washing, most of the group headed off to the site of the Jim Bowie BBQ Competition for the show. Again the tantalizing aroma of the best barbeque in three states teased the car show participants. Only the judges got to taste it!! Around 45 cars were entered. (See below for BMCNO participants.)

Six of the ladies headed for downtown Natchez where they enjoyed a carriage ride through the historic area. The tour guide pointed out an exhibit hundreds of historic pictures at First Presbyterian Church's Stratton Chapel Gallery at 405 State St, which the ladies later toured. The photographs include professional portraits and images of everyday life in Natchez from the Civil War through the mid-20th century. Thousands of original glass plate negatives taken by three Natchez professional photographers and lost for decades, were "found" on the porch of a local couple. Those that were salvageable were developed and the cream of the crop is on exhibit in the chapel while many more were sent to LSU. The ladies spent over an hour in the gallery and didn't begin to see them all.

On Saturday evening, a large group went to Monmouth Plantation for dinner. After cocktails (mint juleps!) and "amuse bouches" in the Quitman Lounge, they enjoyed a five course "Chef's Table" dinner in the mansion. Our first stop was an unplanned visit Billv's to Boudin & Cracklins in Krotz Springs where Alan wanted to stop and buy some Cajun goodies. One of its stops was Opelousas, and a museum was included in the village. During the visit Jim and several of our intrepid LBC mechanics tried to diagnose the TD's charging problem. After boudin tastin', we had time to spend in the culture museum to learn about Cajun history and lifestyles. The culture center is manned by national park rangers and it is



a first class museum that we enjoyed.

On to the Liberty Theater next door for the live Cajun music radio and TV show. A sign on the door said "Welcome British Motor Club of Louisiana". It turns out that after hearing about the Eunice cruise the previous weekend at Vidalia, one of our new members, Deryl Brown, who happens to be from Eunice told city hall we were coming. They were happy to have us visit, and let the theater know to welcome us. Similarly, during the radio/ TV show, the MC, a local radio show host, men-

tioned our club a few times during the show/broadcast.

In a weekend of highlights, the Cajun music show took top billing. The show was great, with a live band playing Cajun music, the MC speaking French much of the night for his radio/TV audience, and plenty of Cajun dancing. We had a special

guest for the evening, Keith's 93 year old grandmother, who Keith got out on the dance floor to get the club going. 

Of course many of the comments were about the meals, as usual, which were great. Tom Miller and Jim Bowers talked about the Eunice cruise and how much fun we had on that outing. The car had a new Weber carburetor and exhaust header installed by the previous (deceased) owner, and maybe the fuel lines weren't tight, or they split, or maybe it wasn't the fuel lines at all. Tom Miller talked about a great fire extinguisher that he uses for SCCA races called Fire Ade. They're safe for automotive use and won't damage paint and electrical equipment under the hood. Google the name and go to the web site. If you need to be convinced to carry a fire extinguisher in your car, look at the picture.



Then we talked about upcoming events, who was planning to go, and where and when to meet. The Baton Rouge convoy will leave the Bass Pro parking lot at 8:30 this Friday, October 22 for the Fairhope show, and then at the same time on November 7 for A Taste of Bavaria.

Almost all of us talked about the projects we're doing with our cars, it seems like everybody is doing something to improve, upgrade, maintain, or restore a car, which is good to talk about and hear how everybody is doing. Rick talked about his experience with B&C Electric, a shop on our Little British Car service list, and how happy he was with the work they did rebuilding his '64 Healey starter.

Hurricanes and Your British Car by Chad Wicker

As a new British Car owner and new club member, I am faced with the contemplation of what would/has occurred with the devastating effects of hurricanes and our cars. Though I'm primarily referencing Katrina, I would also include Rita, Ivan, and pretty much any other hurricane. Rick Huber's Project Update – 1964 Austin Healey 3000

Rick Huber and Peter Brauen continue to make good progress on Rick's 1964 Austin-Healey 3000. The engine/transmission/rear end, the suspension, braking system, air conditioning system, electrical system and all lights, instruments installed in the new dashboard, intake manifold/ heat shield/carbs, exhaust manifold and exhaust system have all been installed. At this point we're waiting for the interior kit with carpets, door panels, vinyl for covering the center console, leather seat kits, and the convertible top and top cover to arrive from Sports & Classics in Connecticut. We ordered and paid for the whole kit in June, and have been trying to get them to complete and deliver it for the last month or more. Moral to that story that we've all heard before - don't pay the whole amount until it's delivered. Another long delay has been for the wire wheels, Dayton's, which were also ordered in June. The Dayton factory has apparently been swamped with orders; either that or they don't make too many wheels any more. Needless to say, they've been delayed for months, but in this case, the seller has an incentive to deliver since only a deposit was paid in June. They were shipped last week, so in the next week or two, the tires will be mounted, and then the wheels can be put on the car. Once the interior kit arrives, it shouldn't be too many more trips to Kiln before Rick's Healey is ready to take its first drive since the early 1990's when it was disassembled, and wow, will Rick be a happy Healey owner/driver.





A Barn Find That Wasn't – Part I, The Hunt by Rick Huber

Throughout all of our Little British Car lives we've heard of the amazing barn finds that people resurrect and put back on the road, many times with very little effort. A year and a half ago, I thought I had found the barn find of my life, a 1956 Austin Healey 100. Instead it has turned into many months of disappointment and misery that I could have done without. Here's part one of my three part story, which I'll call The Hunt.

It all started when a friend and Healey owner here in Baton Rouge, Todd Bourque, drove me by an old, decrepit house here in Baton Rouge, just a few miles from (Continued on page 22)

my own, the day after Thanksgiving, 2008 to see a big Healey in the carport, only partially visible from the street. The house was unoccupied, and the roof covered with blue tarpaulins after hurricane Gustav blew through that fall. Although the car was very hard to see, covered with a large piece of paneling, behind a boat, and with corrugated roofing material leaning against it, sure enough it was an early big Healey. It looked like it had been out in the elements for many years, and was pretty rough for what we could see. The car was Iris Blue with many patches of red colored primer, and a red primer bonnet. We couldn't see much, but it looked like it would take quite a bit of work to get it going again. Todd said he had seen the



car there for years but had never tried to make contact with the owner. I decided to give it a shot. I took several pictures of the house and the car.

With the address, I worked through the Parish records offices to find out the owner of the house. I found out the house belonged to Debra Lockhart, who had inherited the house from her father R.P. Lockhart after he passed away in 2007. I tried to identify the owner of the car through DMV by using the 1992 registration and license plate number, but their electronic records didn't go back that far, so they couldn't help me. Alternatively, I figured there couldn't be too many Austin-Healeys registered in Louisiana, and I asked a friend to get me a list of them. Sure enough, the records showed a 1956 Austin-Healey 100 registered to R. P. Lockhart. I looked up the VIN number in my Original Austin-Healey book, the number showed that it was actually a 1955 BN1 model, although by looking at the car, it was a BN2 model that started production 9 months after this car (or engine) was made.

OK, so I had the information. I was dealing with a lady whose father had owned the car and passed away. I tried to get a phone number, but none was available. I talked to neighbors, but they said they didn't know where I could find Debra. I mailed a letter telling her that I was interested in buying the car and left the same letter on the door of the house. After about a month of searching and digging up information and trying to contact the owner, I finally decided I had done all that I could do, and it was time to be patient and wait.
