September is the Funkana organized by the Acadiana group and English Motoring Club of Mississippi Natchez Car Show


October - Our Cruisin' the Coast event organized by the Gulf Coast group, 2014 Board of Directors Election, and South Alabama Fairhope Car Show.

Sandy and Sam Walter joined us from Mobile and provided an update on what was going on at their club. The Fairhope Car Show is coming up and this year Triumphs get a discount on the registration. Joel Ross announced his engagement and thanked the club members for convincing him not to sell his little British Car.

Past events were discussed including the Crawfish Boil and the Delgado Tech Session. The tech session was on removing body dents and some dents were removed on a boot lid from Keith Venzina's MGB and multiple dents were removed on Ronnie Palmisano's Triumph. British Motoring Club New Orleans—Board of Directors

(a) **Authority:** All of the corporate powers of this corporation and the management of its affairs shall be vested in and controlled by the Board of Directors.

(b) **Election and Term**: Directors shall be elected annually by the members at a General Meeting of the club in the last quarter of each calendar year. Nominations for officers must be received by the Secretary four weeks prior to the General Meeting at which the election is to be held. Such directors shall assume office at the January officers' meeting and shall hold office for one year, with the limitation of three (3) consecutive terms in any one position. The exception to the term limitation being that of the office of Editor. In the event a director's position becomes vacant, the Board of Directors shall appoint a replacement officer until the next General meeting at which the club shall elect a replacement director.

(c) **Number of Directors**: The Board of Directors shall consist of five members, who shall also serve as the President, Vice-President, Newsletter Editor, Secretary, and Treasurer of the Club. Additional directors (herein referred to as members-at-large) shall be elected for every thirty (30) members in good standing. When the average number of members exceeds thirty per each member-at-large, another member-at-large shall be added to the Board of Directors at the next scheduled election of Directors.

(d) Duties

President: The President shall preside at all meetings of the members and officers and shall perform the duties usually pertaining to this office. The President will serve as the Chief Executive Officer of the Club and as Chairman of the Board of Directors. Special meetings may be called only by the President's authority.

Vice President: It shall be the duty of the Vice President to act as Activities Director and Chairman of all Club Committees. In the absence of the President, the Vice President shall preside at meetings of the members and officers.

Treasurer: The Treasurer shall, subject to such conditions and restrictions as may be made by the officers, have custody of all monies, debts, and obligations belonging to the Club. All money of the Club shall be received and deposited into the Club account by the Treasurer. All debts of the Club shall be paid by the Treasurer. Any contracts, checking drafts, notes, or other orders for payment of money shall be co-signed in the name of the Club by the President and the Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be prepared to report on the financial status of the Club at every meeting.

Secretary: The secretary shall keep records of all minutes and notes. The Secretary shall keep an updated roll of all Club members. The Secretary shall prepare the ballot for election of officers and process absentee ballots.

Newsletter Editor: The Newsletter Editor shall publish a club newsletter as set forth elsewhere in these by-laws.

Members-at-Large: It shall be the duty of the Members-at-Large to represent the general club membership at all meetings. Members-at-Large may be assigned certain duties by a majority of the officers.

(e) No obligations, debts, or other liability shall be incurred on behalf of the Club by any board member without the specific prior approval of a majority of the directors.



mostly early Ford vehicles and memorabilia. The garage has 50 + restored cars and it is not open to the public. We arrived at the Champagne garage at 1PM, and left at 3PM. After we left the Champagne garage , we continued to the Covington Brew house and Tap Room in downtown Covington.

The Covington Brew house (formerly Heiner Brau, founded by the German-trained brew master who helped start Abita Beer) opened for a tour and tasting at 4:30 pm. Their highly-regarded beers are Strawberry Ale, Pontchartrain Pilsner, and Bayou Bock, plus a couple of seasonal brews. The Brew house is across from the Tap Room and the Trailhead where the Great Racers arrived.

We had enough time to tour and taste before going over to take a look at the "race cars" and meet the racers.

We then viewed the Great Race finale at the Trailhead in Covington. More than 100 cars, all of which were built in 1968 or before, rolled into Covington. The cars started coming in at 5 pm, almost 100 of them at one per minute or so, The cars were participating in the Hemming's Great Race which started in St Paul, MN, and ended in Mobile, AL. The Covington stop coincided with the kick-off of Covington's bicentennial celebration.

Forty + BMCNO members and their families were there to greet these beautiful classic cars. Then it was off to grab a bite to eat.

LAWS THAT CANNOT BE BROKEN

18 Bugeyes, TCs and TDs, FIATS, and 1 Turner were out to defeat us...or at least expose us for the "Rule bending/breakers that we most surely were".....Ho-Hum...As Sunday's Feature 15 lapper is flagged away Jack as usual consistently pulled away from the field by 2 or

- 1 1/2 packages (12 ounces) cream cheese
- 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter, softened
- 2 teaspoons vanilla


3/4 to 1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts for the top and sides to sprinkle on the cake.

So What Does It Cost To Operate A Jaguar? By Don Marpe



The marquee that is being featured this July / August at the general meeting and in some of the information in this newsletter is Jaguar. Don Marpe and Wally Friloux will be giving a brief history of the Jaguar at the July General

Meeting. A summary of the presentation will be in this newsletter. Since there are 38 Jaguars owned by club members and 21 of them are 1990 or newer, Don Marpe thought some of you would like a redo of the operating costs he had with his 1997 XK8. As Wally tells us constantly, Jaguars are not the cheapest cars to own but that are one of the most fun to drive. Here is the info that Don Marpe collected on his Jag.

My Jaguar XK8 had over 180,000 miles on it when the wiring harness started shorting out and I sold it. I had kept pretty good maintenance and cost records, so I thought I would analyze what the operating costs were along the way. At three years old and with 50,000 miles, the depreciation was \$24,000 based on the new purchase price of \$68,000. Since any problems are covered under warranty, the operating cost (gas, maintenance, and insurance – based on my actual records) is pretty low (\$0.15 / mile). At 70,000 miles on the car, the resale price takes a pretty big hit. The value has drops to around \$30,000. The operating costs are still pretty low (\$0.18 / mile).

When you hit 100,000 miles, the resale value goes in the dumper. \$18,000 is about as much as you will get for the car. You are past the warranty, but the reliability is still pretty good, the operating costs do not go up much (\$0.19 / mile). At 150,000 miles and beyond, the resale value pretty much stays at \$10,000. Even with extremely high mileage, a Jaguar XK8 still looks good and there is someone out there that will want it. You start to get into some component wear out issues and higher dollar maintenance items so the operating cost goes up to \$0.25 / mile.

If you just figure the maintenance and operating costs, a Jaguar is a reasonable car to own. But if you figure in the depreciation costs, you need to remember how much fun the Jag is to drive and how cool you look in the driver's seat or depression will set in.

Brief History of Jaguar Cars By Don Marpe

Founded as Swallow Sidecar Company in December 1922 by Sir William Lyons and William Walmsley to make motorcycle side cars. Started making cars as SS Cars Ltd and in 1935 SS Jaguar. SS 90 two seater had 2.5 liter engine 68 hp. After World War II, dropped the SS in the name.

Sports cars we know are the XK 120 in 1949 that developed into XK 140 in 1954 and then XK 150 in 1957. Then came the E-Types in 1961, The various versions lasted until 1974. In 1975 the XJ-S was introduced and stayed the only sport version offered until 1996. In 1997 the XK8 models were introduced and were the first new model developed under Ford's ownership. In 2007, the XK model was introduced and is still the current sport coupe / convertible.

In 1997, the XJ220 was produced in small quantities and was at the time the fastest production car with a speed of 217 mph. It was a beautiful car, but ended up being relegated to a short term racing series that resembled a demolition derby for those that remember it. The new F Type is now available and is a true two seater sports car. Paretti has sold 4 units already at over \$90,000 each.


Large Sedans or saloons that we know started with the Mark V in 1948. It was followed in 1951 with the Mark VII and then the Mark VIII in 1957 and Mark IX in 1959 and finally the Mark X in 1961. In 1966 the 420G was introduced. In 1968 the XJ series started in various 6, 12, and 8 designations depending on the engine. Versions of this still continue.

Mid-size sedans started in 1955 with the Mark 1 and 2. The S-Type was introduced in 1963 and again in 1999. In 1966 the 420 and later 240 and 340 models were introduced. In 2001 the X-Type was introduced and in 2008, the XF became the current version offered.

A Good Friday, Fiction By Thomas Bonner, Jr.

The MGB roadster with its British racing green reflecting the late afternoon rays of a spring sun sped over the raised highway above the Atchafalaya swamp. The Acadian country shone bright in spring green and lavender. Each spring Bern and Jackie made this seasonal pilgrimage during Easter week. At seventy miles per hour, the engine hummed evenly, the warm air blowing into the cockpit and out the unzipped rear window.

The winter had been cold and damp this year. The floors of Bern's and Jackie's shotgun cottage in New Orleans had cracks, seeming to reflect their own relationship. In the evening he would come in from his office at the investment firm, put on a sweater, and settle down with a bourbon and the Times-Picayune. She arrived earlier from school, had tea and reviewed her lesson plans before preparing supper, usually with fresh vegetables. In the evenings she often suggested taking the ageing MG out for a drive along Lake Shore Drive or up River Road--they would have to insulate themselves against the cold and inevitable leaks from the rag top and fender joints. He usually begged off by commenting on the obvious weather conditions and the troublesome running issues of the car during the cold months of the year, but these excuses had little to do with his real reason. He did not want to be confined with her in a tight space for over an hour. She knew this as she would often look out the kitchen window at the little British car, its cover secured by a rope across the center of the undercarriage.

Bern looked at the MG, too, and thought of "the open road" and blue skies when he left for work in the darkness of early mornings. The dark brown stain from the oil leak had grown. He nearly always thought he would attend to it on the weekend. One day Jackie slipped in it, forcing him to clean the floor of the carport, but he still didn't attend to the leak. He did love her, but in the few years since their marriage, he seemed to have less to say to her, even though she responded to him with real affection, even spontaneity. In the beginning they did things together on the weekends, and now she would be in a shopping mall searching for bargains and he at a sports bar with guys from work. He felt guilty about the situation, but not enough to do anything about it. Her eyes told him something once there was missing.

The warming winds of March signaled the removal of the cover on the MG. Jackie had found herself talking more than usual with Fred, the barista at PJ's coffee shop, and her openness alarmed her. Bern began getting the MG ready for a drive, but its preparation was not an overnight affair. She brought him coffee and a wipe to remove battery acid. She asked about the oil, and he replied that at least he would try to get it under control. As long as he had the MG, there had been a leak. A week later when they finally took their first drive, the car stalled and was towed back home. She listened to him speculate on the causes-much of which she had heard before. The next weekend engine parts covered one side of the carport. When she stepped through them on the way to the clothesline-she still believed in hanging sheets in the sun after the winter--he cautioned her not to kick any of the parts. She asked about one, the coil, and he briefly explained its function in the ignition.

Three weeks later the MG was running consistently--with the oil spot small and nearly clear. Now they were nearly in Lafayette. Jackie had talked about the ruins of the railroad trestle across the swamp and the failure of the Southern Pacific to complete the crossing. As they turned into Pinhook Road, the MG bumped hard across railroad tracks. A crunching sound followed as the



car quickly ground to a halt. A fan blade had lodged in the radiator. A local shop fixed it the next morning. Bern was upset. Being an amateur mechanic, he had not examined the fan or the radiator, after the MG had been in Mo's Auto Repair for major work at the end of summer. By early afternoon they departed Lafayette for New Iberia on the old highway. The MG was running smoothly they were both relieved.

A half hour later as they passed a small match making plant, Bern drove the MG across its railroad tracks. The dreaded noise recurred as the car again came to an untimely halt. There was little traffic as the very Catholic town was shut down for Good Friday services. Bern's frustration was palpable, as they walked looking for an open garage. Finally, Jackie called a shop down a nearby bayou and miraculously found it open. Three hours later the MG appeared to be in running condition again. Although she had said little during

the entire experience, she had examined the pocket repair manual in the glove compartment. She had, however, listened with empathy to Bern's ranting about "these British cars." As he was preparing to ease the car onto the road, she asked him to stop and shut the engine down. He looked at her as most men would in this situation, but he did as he was asked-almost told. After looking at a diagram in the manual, she asked him to open the hood. Looking at her with one lifted eye brow, he did. The engine only warm, she reached down the side of the radiator and pulled. It moved. The two lower bolts were missingobviously missing since the car had been at Mo's. The garage had two bolts that fit. As they headed for a motel, Bern asked Jackie about Tuesday's farmers' market. In the morning sun, the MGB with its top down moved quickly on the narrow road surrounded by fields of sugar cane and east across the planked bridge to the highway.

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
