Ronnie Palmisano called the meeting to order at 7:10. There were 19 members and guests at the meeting. The first subject in old business was the Pensacola Car Show. Rick Huber, Keith Vezina and others (13 people from the club attended) pro-

vided information on the car show activities. The Panhandle club had good activities set up for the Friday before the show. The most impressive was the welcome reception that was held at the local museum of commerce. They spared no expense on renting the museum and the assortment of food offered. There was even a Beatles cover band. There were 130 people at the reception. The car show had 130 cars with the usual mix of cars. There were 8 Sunbeam Tigers which was unusual. 12 MGB and some TR 3 and 4s. All that attended agreed that it was a good show.

Next on the agenda was the crawfish boil. It will be on May 18 with more details in this past newsletters and in emails that will be sent out just prior to the event.

The Progressive Dinner was discussed and set up for June 21. There will be more details in this newsletter.

There was also news that Paretti is selling some of the cars they have collected over the years. Apparently, one of every version of Jaguar since 1940s was put away in a secret warehouse. There are 30 cars that will be on the market but most likely at premium prices.

HISTORY OF THE CAR RADIO submitted by Cliff Hughes

It seems like cars have always had radios, but they didn't.

Here's the story:

One evening, in 1929, two young men named William Lear and Elmer Wavering drove their girlfriends to a lookout point high above the Mississippi River town of Quincy, Illinois, to watch the sunset.

It was a romantic night to be sure, but one of the women observed that it would be even nicer if they could listen to music in the car. Lear and Wavering liked the idea.

Both men had tinkered with radios (Lear served as a radio operator in the U.S. Navy during World War I) and it wasn't long before they were taking apart a home radio and trying to get it to work in a car.

But it wasn't easy: automobiles had ignition switches, generators, spark plugs, and other electrical equipment that generate noisy static interference, making it nearly impossible to listen to the radio when the engine was running.

One by one, Lear and Wavering identified and eliminated each source of electrical interference. When they finally got their radio to work, they took it to a radio convention in Chicago.

There they met Paul Galvin, owner of Galvin Manufacturing Corporation. He made a product called a "battery eliminator," a device that allowed battery-powered radios to run on household AC current.

But as more homes were wired for electricity, more radio manufacturers made AC-powered radios.

Galvin needed a new product to manufacture. When he met Lear and Wavering at the radio convention, he found it. He believed that mass-produced, affordable car radios had the potential to become a huge business. Lear and Wavering set up shop in Galvin's factory, and when they perfected their first radio, they installed it in his Studebaker.

Then Galvin went to a local banker to apply for a loan. Thinking it might sweeten the deal, he had his men install a radio in the banker's Packard. Good idea, but it didn't work —; Half an hour after the installation, the banker's Packard caught on fire. (They didn't get the loan.)

Galvin didn't give up. He drove his Studebaker nearly 800 miles to Atlantic City to show off the radio at the 1930 Radio Manufacturers Association convention.

Too broke to afford a booth, he parked the car outside the convention hall and cranked up the radio so that passing conventioneers could hear it. That idea worked. He got enough orders to put the radio into production.

<u>WHAT'S IN A NAME</u> That first production model was called the 5T71.

Galvin decided he needed to come up with something a little catchier. In those days many companies in the phonograph and radio businesses used the suffix "ola" for their names - Radiola, Columbiola, and Victrola were three of the biggest.





Galvin decided to do the same thing, and since his radio was intended for use in a motor vehicle, he decided to call it the *Motorola*.

But even with the name change, the radio still had problems:

When Motorola went on sale in 1930, it cost about \$110 uninstalled, at a time when you could buy a brand-new car for \$650, and the country was sliding into the Great Depression.

(By comparison, a radio for a new car would cost about \$3,000 today.)

In 1930, it took two men several days to put in a car radio -- The dashboard had to be taken apart so that the receiver and a single speaker could be installed, and the ceiling had to be cut open to install the antenna.

These early radios ran on their own batteries, not on the car battery so holes had to be cut into the floorboard to accommodate them.

The installation manual had eight complete diagrams and 28 pages of instructions. Selling complicated car radios that cost 20 percent of the price of a brand-new car wouldn't have been easy in the best of times, let alone during the Great Depression –;

Galvin lost money in 1930 and struggled for a couple of years after that. But things picked up in 1933 when Ford began offering Motorola's preinstalled at the factory.

In 1934 they got another boost when Galvin struck a deal with B. F. Goodrich tire company to sell and install them in its chain of tire stores.

By then the price of the radio, with installation included, had dropped to \$55. The Motorola car radio was off and running.

(The name of the company would be officially changed from Galvin Manufacturing to

"Motorola" in 1947.)

In the meantime, Galvin continued to develop new uses for car radios.

In 1936, the same year that it introduced pushbutton tuning, it also introduced the Motorola Police Cruiser, a standard car radio that was factory preset to a single frequency to pick up police broadcasts.

In 1940 he developed the first handheld two-way radio -- The Handy-Talkie -; for the U. S. Army. A lot of the communications technologies that we take for granted today were born in Motorola labs in the years that followed World War II.

In 1947 they came out with the first television for under \$200.

In 1956 the company introduced the world's; first pager; in 1969 came the radio and television equipment that was used to televise Neil Armstrong's first steps on the Moon.

In 1973 it invented the world's first handheld cellular phone.

Today Motorola is one of the largest cell phone manufacturers in the world.

And it all started with the car radio.

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO the two men who installed the first radio in Paul Galvin's car?

Elmer Wavering and William Lear ended up taking very different paths in life.

Wavering stayed with Motorola. In the 1950's he helped change the automobile experience again when he developed the first automotive alternator, replacing inefficient and unreliable generators. The invention lead to such luxuries as power windows, power seats, and, eventually, airconditioning. Lear also continued inventing.

He holds more than 150 patents. Remember eight -track tape players? Lear invented that. But what he's really famous for are his contributions to the field of aviation. He invented radio direction finders for planes, aided in the invention of the autopilot, designed the first fully automatic aircraft landing system, and in 1963 introduced h in semost famous invention of all, the Lear Jet, the world's first mass-produced, affordable business jet. (Not bad for a guy who dropped out of school after the eighth grade.)

Sometimes it is fun to find out how some of the many things that we take for granted actually came into being! AND It all started with a woman's suggestion!



Tire Choices by Rick Huber



I know it's something we all do pretty regularly, both for our Little British Cars and Bikes as well as for our modern cars, and that is buy tires. After many years and many tire purchases, I just learned something

new I thought I would share. After spinning my Healey in 2012, I was determined to get "stickier" tires, and to make a more informed tire choice the next time I bought them.

Previously, I thought the best you could do to determine the grip of tires was to buy a higher speed rating. I had bought Z and V rated tires for the V8 MGB. My brother told me there's another rating, the Uniform Tire Quality Grade (UTQG) tread wear rating that measures how long a tire will last, or the inverse, how soft or "sticky" the rubber is. The stickier the rubber, the lower the tread wear rating, and the shorter the wear life of the tire. But, at the same time the better gripping and the cornering performance - hey that's what we're looking for! Let's face it, we're not going to be putting 40,000 miles on these tires anyway.

Typical passenger car tires' UTQG rating varies between about 400 and 800, all other factors being equal, the 800 rated tires should last twice as many miles as the 400 rated tires. If you look for tires on TireRack.com, you can sort by the UTQG rating to try to find the highest mileage or conversely the stickiest or best gripping, best traction tire in any particular size. So I looked up the Kuhmo Powerstar 758, 165-80/15, H speed rating (130 mph) tires I had on my Healey, and their

UTQG rating is 400. I bought that size for the "original" look and feel, but you can see they're pretty skinny with not much rubber on the road. That might be more of my problem than the grip. Tires that were recommended to me by another LBC enthusiast after the spin were Goodyear Eagle GT's. Although they have a higher V speed rating (149 mph), their UTQG rating is 440. So those tires don't necessarily grip any better than the Kuhmos.

It looks like as you pursue lower and lower UTQG ratings, prices go up and selection goes down. If you look for expensive racing tires, you can find



UTQG ratings at 100 or below. A reasonable compromise is the Vredestein Sprint Classic tires for Vintage Cars, made to provide an "original" look for our cars (although not all the way to bias belted like in the 50's and 60's), with a UTQG rating of 220. A recent Classic Motorsports article compared tires and the Vredesteins came out in the middle on price, but best for performance, and were chosen as the tires to buy. Yes, they're more expensive than the Kuhmos or the Goodyears, but the next time I buy tires for the Healey, I believe I'll spend the extra money and get some stickier rubber on which to roll around those corners. Happy motoring!

Currently there are many items available. These include service manuals and how to books and videos.



The standard for these classes is the way the Triumph appeared and functioned when it left the dealer showroom as a new vehicle whether it is original or restored.



MODIFIED Categories

A car shall be deemed to be "MODIFIED", and placed in one of the two modified classes, if there is a major component change, i.e. engine, or multiple (2 or more) minor component changes, multiple body and/or trim modifications.

MODIFIED TOURING

The standard for this class is an original or restored Triumph set up with modern equipment for touring which does not alter the driving character of the car but enhances the reliability and ease of maintenance. Common modifications for eligibility are wheels, tires, exhaust, ignition, alternator, air cleaners, valve covers, electric fans, paint colors, soft tops, suspension, steering wheels, seat belts, dash boards and/or stereo system.

MODIFIED PREPARED

The standard for this class is an original or restored Triumph set up with performance modifications by modifying any major component. This would include performance ignition system, fuel system modifications, transmission conversions, major interior, suspension or body alterations.

SENIOR CLASS

Any car which has won one (1) First Place Award in Concours (Not Participants' Choice) MAY enter Senior Class. After two (2) First Place Awards, he/she MUST enter Senior Class for the period of the next four VTR National Conventions. Senior Class will be judged against the score sheet only. A score of 350 points or better is required to receive the Senior Award. After winning a Senior Award the car must be entered in Preservation Class if the owner wishes to pursue Concours. There can be any number of Senior Awards at any convention.

PRESERVATION CLASS

If the owner wishes to pursue Concours after having obtained one Senior Award, the car shall be entered for a Preservation Award. The scoring shall be the same as for Senior except that a score

of 365 points shall be required for the awarding of a Preservation Award. Preservation Award cars must be preregistered. There shall be no limit to the number of Preservation Awards that a given automobile may win.
