Marching bands, dance groups, police officers and Santa Claus will parade down Jefferson Highway Saturday during the 22nd Annual Harahan Christmas Parade. A total of 28 groups and seven floats will take part in this year's procession, according to organizer David Roberts, a sergeant with parade's sponsor, the Harahan Police Department.

The parade begins at Noon on Jefferson Highway at Hord Street and will travel about 2 miles to Folse Street, Roberts said. The reigning king and queen will be B.J. Stevinson and Mindy Harrison, students from the Magnolia School. Jefferson Parish President John Young will be the grand marshal.

Representatives from Harahan Police, the Jefferson Parish Sheriff's Office, Gretna Police, Kenner Police and the U.S. Coast Guard will appear Saturday.

The parade will feature marching bands from Riverdale High School in Old Jefferson and John Curtis Christian School in River Ridge, Roberts said. ROTC units from several local schools, including Riverdale and Grace King High School in Metairie will also march.



September 2014 Meeting Minutes by Don Marpe BMCNO Secretary



President Ronnie Palmisano called the meeting to order shortly after 7 pm. There were 23 members and guests present and most were enjoying the food at the Italian Pie. New member Dale Lauque

was introduced and he gave us a brief summary of the reasons he joined the club and the cars that he has. He later offered his shop parking area to any club members going to the Gramercy area bonfires around Christmas.

For old business the Natchez car show was discussed by those that attended. The ladies praised the shopping and tours of homes set up by the host club. The guys said there were only 39 cars in the show but they still thought it was a good show and several brought back trophies.

The Peachtree MG Club show was the next item discussed. The show was in Dillard Georgia. This show had 140 cars and they included all British marquees. By all accounts this was a great show. It went from Thursday to Sunday with events each day and great food each night. The host club set up several trips and events to keep the attendees busy.

The Vintage Triumph Registry (VTR) national event was the next item discussed. The event was in Dobson North Carolina with some of the show being in Mount Powell (the town Andy Griffin's Marberry was based on). There were 289 Triumphs of all versions at the show and almost all were in perfect condition. The host club had set up the car display area in Sheldon Vineyards with different areas of the various classes. In addition to the show, there was a timed hill climb event and a Moonshine rally. be in future newsletters.

This show prompted some discussion on how many club members belong to VTR, NAMGR, and NAMGB. A club needs to have a certain number of members in these groups to be allowed to use that groups insurance coverage at our car show. The board members will make an effort to get an accurate count of the current members in these associations and determine any needed actions. In addition to these national clubs for Triumphs and MGs, the national Jaguar club will also be considered in this effort.

This meeting was the final time for people to be nominated to hold positions on the Board of Directors for the club. The final additions and adjustments to the nominations were made and the nominations were closed. The nominated candidates are shown in other sections of this newsletter.



Delgado Community College Tech Session "How to tune up you British Car"



Maybe it was the free coffee and doughnuts, but there was a great turnout of BMCNO Members (and some potential new members) to listen to



Randy Trayler (Delgado Automotive Department Instructor) give them the basics of engine tuneups. There were 26 people and one MG T in the classroom when the session started. Dave Loeb volunteered his T to be the show and tell vehicle and Danny Varnado, Ronnie Palmisano, Mike Lewis, and others brought in parts of cars and tools that would be passed around and discussed.

Randy started out the class with a good discussion on issues and things to do that centered on gas, coolant systems, and lubricants. Several attendees provided their own stories and recommendations on these areas. It was clear that Randy had

done a lot of research on British cars prior to the class. He had found several U-Tube videos that helped provide instructions on how to do the basics in tuning the engine. The videos will be helpful as refresher training before you take on any of these tasks on your car so the titles are included in this article. The first one was "147.MG Carburetor Tuning". This started with an explanation of what hoses do what, what hoses to disconnect to tune the carburetor, and the steps to do the adjustments. It was very detailed and showed the special tools needed to balance the carburetors. Fortunately, Danny Varnado had brought along those special tools. We all now know who to be friends with before you start working on your carburetor.

The next video was "Carburetor Floats – 3 Things that can go wrong". It was pretty quick but did show the possible problems. There is a series of related videos on float adjustments and other carburetor instructions that show up on U-Tube. Next was a short video on "How Ignition Systems Work". It was pretty basic, but some us needed something that basic. Then came "How to set points" and "Fitting Accu Spark electronic Ignition to MGB".

When the videos were finished, some of the items members brought for show and tell were passed around and their stories (Continued on page 19)



hours driving, breakfast, Cruisin' the coast, snack and Bay St. Louis tour.



I Really Want To Buy A Jaguar F Type, But Should I Really? by Don Marpe



Jaguar has done a great job at making the new Jaguar F-Type seem like a car that future car buffs will talk about the same way they talk about the E-Types of the past. Most of the Automobile Magazine writers and car test drivers rave about the F-

Type and its performance. Even Porsche seems to be concerned that the F-Type may steal some business.

So is this a car that a normal member of the British Car Club New Orleans should buy? Many of the members have done a test drive of the various models and have great things to say about the car. Yet none have bought one. Probably the biggest reason there has not been a F-Type parked in the Italian Pie lot on a Tuesday night is that you could put around six of our members Little British Cars in the parking lot for the same price. But if rationalize that you would keep the F-Type long enough for it to become a classic car like the E-Type, you may be able to convince yourself (and your spouse) it is money well spent. Let's assume that money is not the deciding factor.

What are the things that are important to a BMCNO member? One very important thing would be could the car win an award at the annual British Car Day. At least for the first few shows, an F-Type would certainly beat out the modern Jag perineal winner Wally Friloux. For some people, that alone would be worth the price of the car.

Another important thing to a member is the fun of taking the car out on a weekend drive. There is no question the F-Type would satisfy that need. Plus, your spouse would also come along since there is air conditioning and no leaks.

Another thing that members normally do for fun is work on their Little British Cars. Some members do most of the work themselves and some depend on Keith Vezina for the complicated work. After looking under the hood of the F Type, washing and waxing will likely be the extent of the hands on fun you can have. The rest will be up to Paretti.

There are a few members that use their Little British Cars as daily drivers. At the price of the F -Type, you probably will not be able to afford another car so it would need to be your daily driver. So now we need to look (continued on page 25)

at what things are important for a car you will use for other than pleasure drives.

Gas mileage is not a big thing but is something that needs to be considered. The Jag F Type has three engine sizes. The normal six cylinder (340 hp) with a little super charging, the six cylinder (380 hp) with a lot of super charging, and the eight cylinder (495 hp) with a lot of super charging. The predicted mileage rating for the normal six is 20 city and 28 highway, for the other six is 19 city and 27 highway and for the eight it is 16 city and 23 highway. These ratings are not great but they are acceptable and probably better than the old Little British Cars get. The 18 gallon fuel tank will still be enough to keep you in the driver's seat longer than you bottom can take it.

Since your spouse will be riding with you a lot, you need to consider ride comfort. If you get the sport handling option which only comes in the F-Type S and costs and additional \$3,000, the suspension can be adjustable. There is the factory setting (ie track mode) and the custom setting. The Paretti salesman told me that even with the softest suspension settings, there is not a "wife in

the car" ride quality. If you consider the quality of the roads in New Orleans, this may be a deal breaker. You will need to do an extended test drive to decide if the ride is acceptable.

The next question will be the ability to handle more than one passenger. There is no way even the smallest grandchild could be a third passenger in the F-Type. But that is really no different than other Little British Cars.

Trunk space is the next question. I have always told my wife that if the groceries fit in one cart, they will fit in the trunk. There may be some question on whether that is true in the F-Type. It will take a trip to Sams or Rouses to answer that question.

The next thing to consider is neighbor envy. Parking the F-Type in front of the house or in the front part of the driveway will definitely have the neighbor men and boys wishing they could have one.

The next step in this decision process will be test drives. Those results will be in next month's newsletter.

British Motoring Club New Orleans Car Day March 21, 2015 by Don Marpe



The Publicity and Promotions Chairperson is responsible for all advertisements, media releases, and articles related Show. This involves submitting information to the many British Car related web sites,

magazines, newspapers, TV stations and any other way of promoting the car show. The level of effort for this position starts in November (two days to send information to all of the web sites) and picks up again in the month before the show to coordinate any newspaper and TV information.

The Donations Committee Chairperson is probably the hardest and more important jobs needed for the car show. This involves sending letters to vendors to ask them to donate some product or offer money to sponsor the show. Then following up with phone calls or face to face meetings with the vendors to encourage them to participate. When the donations start to come in you need to track all of the dollars and gifts so that when the car show is over the appropriate thank you letters are sent. We could still have a car show without this position, but there would be no money for the Delgado scholarships. The level of effort for this position starts in January (several days to send out letters) and continues up to the day of the show (at least part of a day each week) and is over when all of the thank you letters are sent out.

The Trophy and Awards Committee Chairperson coordinates the design of the trophies for the show based on the T-shirt design, orders the trophies and picks them up in time to be presented at the car show. The level of effort for this position starts in November (make contact with the trophy vendor to place the order) continues in

January (check the progress of the vendor to make sure he will deliver on time) and just before the show to pick up the trophies. It sounds easy but has been a headache in the past.

The Score Sheet Tabulation and Ballot Committee Chairperson makes sure there are enough people available at the show to count the ballots quickly. This person also ensures the needed supplies are available. The level of effort is to line up some volunteers at the general meeting before the show and make sure they show up to count the ballots on the day of the show.

The Parking, Traffic, and Site Preparation Committee Chairperson is one of the more important positions to make sure the show goes smoothly. This person typically gets lots of volunteers to assist with the work but there is some serious responsibilities. The level of effort starts one month before the show to inspect the show site to make sure nothing has changed and does an inventory of the signs used to direct entrants to the show. Based on the preliminary (one week before the show) list of cars entered, develops the class layout for the show field area. Sketches of the field and an Excel model of the field is developed to use to do the marking of the field. The Friday before the show, volunteers help mark the field so that the set up of the field the morning of the show goes quickly. This (Continued on page 29)

position ensured that there are enough volunteers on the day of the show to set up the field, place the signs directing to the show, control the traffic into the show area and safely direct traffic at the end of the show. This positon will work with registration to make any adjustments in the field layout required by day of the show registrations.

The Raffle and Regalia Committee Chairperson coordinates the purchase of items to be sold at the car show and ensures there are volunteers on the day of the show to sell the items. The 50/50 raffle tickets and door prize give away drawings are also coordinated by this position. Other than purchasing items year round and coordinating volunteers, the level of effort is full time the day of the show.



The Photography Committee Chairperson needs a good camera and some helpers to stage the cars. Once the pictures are taken, the camera card is taken to the photo lab and the pictures are made. The level of effort is full time on the day of the show to set up the photo area, take pictures, run to the photo lab, put the pictures in the folders and place them on tables so the entrants can pick them up.

The Show Day Entertainment Committee Chairperson makes sure the PA system is moved from the storage location to the show and is set up and functions. This person can be the person with the mic and make announcements during the show or can find a volunteer to do the announcing. If there is a decision to have a band or guest speaker or other entertainment, this person would coordinate the effort.

There are plenty of opportunities for club members to be actively involved in the 2015 BMCNO Car Day. Contact Don Marpe the 2015 Car Show Chairman to let him know what fits your skills and availability. Since this will be the last year Don will be the chairman, it is a good time to be his assistant so you can take over in 2016.


