As of today we have 183 members therefore requiring 7 Members –at-Large.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS (a) Authority: All of the corporate powers of this corporation and the management of its affairs shall be vested in and controlled by the Board of Directors.

(b) Election and Term: Directors shall be elected annually by the members at a General Meeting of the club in the last quarter of each calendar year. Nominations for officers must be received by the Secretary four weeks prior to the General Meeting at which the election is to be held. Such directors shall assume office at the January officers' meeting and shall hold office for one year, with the limitation of three (3) consecutive terms in any one position. The exception to the term limitation being that of the office of Editor. In the event a director's position becomes vacant, the Board of Directors shall appoint a replacement officer until the next General meeting at which the club shall elect a replacement director. (c) Number of Directors: The Board of Directors shall consist of five members, who shall also serve as the President, Vice-President, Newsletter Editor, Secretary, and Treasurer of the Club. Additional directors (herein referred to as members-atlarge) shall be elected for every thirty (30) members in good standing. When the average number of members exceeds thirty per each member-at-large, another member-at-large shall be added to the Board of Directors at the next scheduled election of Directors.

(d) **Duties President:** The President shall preside at all meetings of the members and officers and shall perform the duties usually pertaining to this office. The President will serve as the Chief Executive Officer of the Club and as Chairman of the Board of Directors. Special meetings may be called only by the President's authority.

<u>Vice President:</u> It shall be the duty of the Vice President to act as Activities Director and Chairman

of all Club Committees. In the absence of the President, the Vice President shall preside at meetings of the members and officers.

Treasurer: The Treasurer shall, subject to such conditions and restrictions as may be made by the officers, have custody of all monies, debts, and obligations belonging to the Club. All money of the Club shall be received and deposited into the Club account by the Treasurer. All debts of the Club shall be paid by the Treasurer. Any contracts, checking drafts, notes, or other orders for payment of money shall be co-signed in the name of the Club by the President and the Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be prepared to report on the financial status of the Club at every meeting.

<u>Secretary:</u> The secretary shall keep records of all minutes and notes. The Secretary shall keep an updated roll of all Club members. The Secretary shall prepare the ballot for election of officers and process absentee ballots.

<u>Newsletter Editor</u>: The Newsletter Editor shall publish a club newsletter as set forth elsewhere in these by-laws.

<u>Members-at-Large</u>: It shall be the duty of the Members-at-Large to represent the general club membership at all meetings. Members-at-Large may be assigned certain duties by a majority of the officers. (e) No obligations, debts, or other liability shall be incurred on behalf of the Club by any board member without the specific prior approval of a majority of the directors.








BMCNO Value Cover Racing by Danny Varnado



Valve cover racing is back at BMCNO. Work is going kind of slow on the launch deck, it's a real rats nest. I designed the original electronics back in the 90's. Bobby and I used to run valve cover, then pinewood derby races at Streetrod shows across the region. When the interest faded in the 2000s, all the equipment went into the attic, until now.

For Natchez, we'll have a full track with handheld



buttons for the Racers to release their cars when they get the green light.

If we have enough interest to justify the work, I'll resurrect the electric eye finish line for our show in March.

Since I got a lift, work on race cars has sped up.

We will have at least 3 regional meets throughout the year and a meet at the annual car show.

BMCNO Value Cover Racing by Danny Varnado continued.....

Below are examples of champion valve cover racers. Use your imagination and build one. It can be a piece of wood with a valve cover on top or something like below, See rules on the following page.





BMCNO Race Rules

The Valve Cover Race Cars:

- No engines or propulsion.
- No moving weights.
- Wheel can be attached to the car in any manner, but must not extend beyond the front of the valve cover.
- Nothing can extend beyond the front of the valve cover.
- Cars shall be based on an actual rocker cover from a British automobile engine.
- Cars must have four wheels, each no more than six inches in diameter.
- Wheel must have a non-metallic surface contacting the track.

Critical Dimensions:

30-inch maximum overall car length.

- 15-inch maximum overall car width.
- 10-inch maximum overall car height.
- 10 pounds maximum weight by official scales.
- The front of the car should have a contact point approximately 2 1/2" high.

Track Dimensions

The Course:

- The course shall consist of a launch incline ten feet long, followed by a level run of sixteen feet – all plywood surfaces.
- The launch incline shall be divided into two lanes, each 18 inches wide. The incline shall be about three feet high at the rearmost part.
- The official "Starting Line" is two feet from the rear edge of the incline.

Running the Race

The Races:


- Double elimination brackets in heats of two cars each. (Each pair will race in each lane 2 out of 3 if a tie)
- Cars will advance in "winners" and "losers" brackets, and the final race will be between those two top cars.
- NOTE: The starting gate is 3.5 inches tall. Racers should have a surface flush with the front of their car approximately 2 ½ to 3" high to contact this metal tab.
- Individual starting via push buttons by each racer, following an electronic "Christmas Tree" lighting system.



The Red Car Revisited, By Thomas Bonner Jr

The recent death of famed racing driver Stirling Moss and the anniversary of the death of legendary driver Jim Clark recall the exciting era of sports car racing in the 1950s, especially the roles of British made cars, like MG, Triumph, Jaguar,

Lotus, and Aston Martin. Hagerty recently had a film online of the famous 1957 Sebring 12 Hour Race with Juan Fangio edging out Moss. A Road & Track article in the last few months mentioned Don Stanford's novel for youngsters, The Red Car, which was originally published in 1954 and which inspired many generations of sports car enthusiasts. Until 2017 the only editions available had grown to be quite expensivebook collector items. That year The Red Car was inducted into the British Sports Car Hall of Fame and reprinted by The Road-Factory. ster This printing (paperback)



"little British cars" and the people who enjoy them.

In the first generation of its readers, The Red Car appealed to boys who had been drawn to serialized novels like those with the adventurous

> Hardy boys (Joe and Frank). The protagonist Hap Adams finds a wrecked MG-TC in the garage of mechanic Frenchy, who happens to be famous racing driver Philippe Lascelle (both names refer to French driving legends). Excited at the prospect of owning and racing the car, Hap begins to repair the car under Frenchy's direction. Like most boys, Hap must convince his parents that owning and driving the car would be good for him. Meanwhile prospect of a the sports car race in his town of Bullet, Colorado brings about a community conflict that is ultimately resolved in

has recently been available on Ebay for \$20. Having long wished to read it, I acquired copies for me and my grandson Jack, who will drive my 1977 MGB in a few years. The Red Car deserves to be revisited as it reminds us of the people, cars and events that have led people like us to value our favor of the road race. When the date for the race arrives, a further problem over Hap's driving the MG-TC comes up. The race itself is the culmination of all that has been building through the story.

Chapters 12 and 13 narrate the race, providing

the most interesting and exciting part of the novel for older and younger readers. Stanford's sentences are those of a sportswriter, emphasizing action, its smells, and sounds: "the high pitched terrier snarls of the M.G.'s," "odor of exhaust fumes," "hard into the next corner, skidding and weaving." The race itself is based on a 1951 Sports Car Club of America (SCCA) road race in Aspen, Colorado, in which Stanford's mechanic held part of the wing so that the race could be completed. An interesting distinction is the author's preference of the MG-TC over the later TD model for its performance.

Stanford's novel reflects his broad education at the Drexel Institute, the Foreign Service Institute, and the Sorbonne (University of Paris). His knowledge of European road races like Le Mans is evident in his references to the motor sport. The journey with a boy hero has the tone of Mark Twain's Huckleberry Finn, and his portrayal of Hap Adams recalls Hemingway's stories of the similarly named youngster Nick Adams. At least two other names have literary allusions. In addition, Stanford uses a running analogy between horse and car, appropriate since Hap and his sister (horse rider) live on a ranch. A teen-age girl also has heroic moments covering the race as a stringer for a newspaper in Denver. The novel weaves serious themes into the action, among them reverence for the sportscars, the thrill of speed and control, and importance of safety and sportsmanship in competition.

For a little book that could fit into a pocket, The Red Car has much to recommend it.





Oil Changing Instructions

Women:

Pull up to Jiffy Lube when the mileage reaches 3000 since the last oil change.

2. Drink a cup of coffee.

3. 15 minutes later, write a check for \$40 and leave with a properly maintained vehicle

Men:

1. Go to O'Reilly auto parts. Write a \$50 check for oil, filter, oil lift (aka kitty litter), hand cleaner and scented tree.

2. Dump old oil from last oil change in back yard.

3. Open a beer and drink it. Jack car up. Look for jack stands.

4. Find jack stands under kid's pedal car.

5. In frustration, open another beer and drink it.

6. Place drain pan under engine.

7. Look for 9/16 box end wrench. Give up and use crescent wrench.8. Round off drain plug hex with crescent wrench.

9. Unscrew drain plug with vise grips.

 Drop drain plug in pan, splashing hot oil on you.
 Clean up using hand cleaner. Have another beer while oil is draining.

12. Look for oil filter wrench. 13. Give up. Poke oil filter with phillips screwdriver and twist it off. 14. Drop oil filter in full oil pan. Clean up a big splash.

15. Beer. Buddy shows up. Finish case with him.

16. Next day, drag pan full of old oil out from underneath car.

17. Throw oil lift (aka kitty litter) on oil spilled during step 16.

18. Beer. No, drank it all yesterday.

19. Walk to 7-11, Buy beer.

20. Apply thin coat of clean oil to filter gasket. Install oil filter.

21. Remove oil filler cap. Drop it down there somewhere.

22. Dump quart of fresh oil into engine. Remember drain plug (step 10).23. Feel around in full drain pan to find drain plug.

24. Clean dirty black oil from hands (step 23).

25. Install drain plug. Stay out of fresh oil on the floor.

26. Slip with crescent wrench and bang knuckles on frame.

27. Bang head on same frame in reaction: Begin cussing fit. Throw wrench.

28. Hit Miss December 1992
with wrench. Cuss additional
1 0 m i n u t e s .
29. Clean up. Apply Band-Aid to knuckle.

30. Beer. Dump in remaining 4 quarts of oil.

31. Look for lost filler cap (step 21). Give up. Stuff old rag in hole.

32. Lower car from jack stands, Accidentally crush one jack stand.

33. Move car back. Throw oil lift (aka kitty litter) to spill (step 22).

34. Drive car to O'Reilly's. Buy new filler cap and one quart of oil.

35. Open hood in front of O'Reilly's. Remove rag (step 31).

36. Pour in oil. Install new filler cap. Check oil level on dipstick.

37. Go back in O'Reilly's. Buy another quart of oil and a filter wrench.

38. Crawl under car. Tighten oil filter. Burn arm on hot exhaust pipe.

39. Remove new oil filler cap and dump in another quart of oil.

40. Ignore the oil trail made going to O'Reilly's while driving back home.

41. Stop in front of the 7-11 when the old oil filler cap goes bouncing down the pavement. Stock up on beer while there since it's almost time for a spark plug change.-
